**Masonic Wages** 

Corn, Wine and Oil



"Corn"

Oil

Corn, wine and oil were the Masonic wages of our ancient brethren.

Wine

How do you earn Masonic wages?

#### **Operative Freemasonry Wages:**

**Master of the Work:** In ancient operative times, the Master of the Work received the highest wages. His wages were corn, wine, oil and sometimes the coin of the realm.

Fellow Craft and Entered Apprentice wages were less than the Master, but they were kept in "mete and drynk" (meat and drink).

**Speculative Freemasonry Wages:** In Speculative Freemasonry, Masonic wages are not earned in coin. They are the rewards earned through acts of kindness, good deeds of service, and the gift of your time to others.

They are earned by mentoring other brethren, helping others, remembering the widow and the orphan and visiting the sick. In short, wages are earned much as the biblical verse says:

"Do unto others as you would HAVE them do unto you."

From the Revised Encyclopedia of Freemasonry by Albert Mackey, Vol. 1, page **244**, 1929

#### Corn, Wine and Oil

Corn, wine and oil are the Masonic elements of consecration. The adoption of these symbols is supported by the highest antiquity. Corn, wine and oil were the most important productions of Eastern countries; they constituted the wealth of the people, and were esteemed as the supports of life and the means of refreshment.

David enumerates them among the greatest blessings that we enjoy, and speaks of them as:

**Psalm 104: 15:** "wine that maketh glad the heart of man, and oil to make his face to shine, and bread which strengtheneth man's heart".

#### **Anointed With Oil:**

In devoting anything to religious purposes, the anointing with oil was considered as a necessary part of the ceremony, a rite which has descended to Christian nations.

 The tabernacle in the wilderness, and all its holy vessels, were, by God's express command, anointed with oil;

- Aaron and his two sons were set apart for the priesthood with the same ceremony;
- ...and the prophets and kings of Israel were consecrated to their offices by the same rite.

Hence, Freemasons' Lodges, which are but temples to the Most High, are consecrated to the sacred purposes for which they were built by strewing corn, wine and oil upon the Lodge, the emblem of the Holy Ark.

Thus does this mystic ceremony instruct us to be nourished with the hidden manna of righteousness, to be refreshed with the Word of the Lord, and to rejoice with joy unspeakable in the riches of divine grace.

**Discourse iv, 81:** "wherefore do you carry you that in the pilgrimage of human life you are to impart:

- a portion of your <u>bread</u> to feed the hungry,
- to send a cup of your <u>wine</u> to cheer the sorrowful,
- and to pour the healing <u>oil</u> of your consolation into the wounds which sickness hath made in the bodies, or affliction rent in the heart, of your fellow-travellers?"

Corn...The Staff of Life: In processions, the corn alone is carried in a golden pitcher, the wine and oil are placed in silver vessels, and this is to remind us that the first, as a necessity and the "staff of life" is of more importance and more worthy of honor than the others, which are but comforts.

**Wine:** ...as a symbol of the inward refreshment of a good conscience is intended, under the name of the *Wine of Refreshment*, to remind us of the eternal refreshments

which the good are to receive in the future life for the faithful performance of duty in the present.

#### *Vol. 2 page 731, 1929*

**Oil:** The Hebrews anointed their Kings, Prophets and High Priests with oil mingled with the richest spices. They also anointed themselves with oil on all festive occasions, whence the expression in

**Psalm xlv, 7:** "God hath anointed thee with the oil of gladness."

## <u>End of Albert Mackey dissertation on Oil, as</u> part of our Masonic Wages.

...And, thus, your unspotted white lambskin Masonic apron is a symbol reminding you of the necessity of the purity of heart, and uprightness of conduct in order to earn the Masonic wages which are due you.

Your final wages will be earned when you leave this world and travel to:

"that House not made with hands", where you will receive your Masonic wages for a life well spent in the "coin" of that realm.

### Independence Day

**4<sup>th</sup> July in Masonic History** it is Independence Day, 2018.

Independence Day is celebrated annually in the United States to recognize the

signing of the Declaration of Independence. The document was meant to explain the reasons why the 13 British colonies of the Americas chose to separate from England. Some scholars believe that the document was not signed until August 2nd, 1776. Although writings from Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and John Hancock all say they signed the Declaration on July 4th, 1776.

Independence Day, in fact the American Revolution itself holds a special place for American Freemasons. We tend to hold up the fact that George Washington, Benjamin Franklin and various members of the Sons of Liberty were leaders in the Revolution.

Although it is true that 9 Freemasons, out of 56, signed the Declaration of Independence, including its most famous signer, John Hancock. It is not so much the men that made the impact on the Revolution. It is the principals of Freemasonry that helped to form the United States of America.

Some scholars point to the publication,
Anderson's Constitutions as a source for
those ideals. Some of the ideals and
codes of conduct which we find in
Anderson's Constitutions would later
appear in the United States Constitution. A
common example is that Religion is not to
be a topic of conversation in a lodge room
where business is to be discussed. This
was seen as an action that could cause a
division within the lodge. Similarly, it can
be equally said, that Religion in
Government could cause that division in
our ruling bodies, not allowing


Government to properly govern for all of its people.

For the Declaration of Independence and the events that lead to it, those who know the lessons that our ritual inculcates it is obvious to see where the men who helped form the early United States believed in those principals, mason or not. As an example, Freemason's believe that we all meet upon the level, the Declaration of Independence states "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal".

In the end Washington, Franklin, Hancock and the list of other notable and not so notable members of the American Revolution who were Freemasons, put themselves in harm's way for their belief in a better future. It becomes less about those men and more about the ideals and principals, many of which are put forth by Freemasonry in the United States and around the World. Those same ideals are stated in our ritual over and over again, not to make them common place, but to remind us of the importance of those words that inspired revolutions, in the United States and beyond.

As we celebrate the birth of the United States we should remember it was those Freemasons involved in the Revolution who had the courage to risk their lives for an ideal. It was in a Freemason lodge where they heard those ideals put forth and where they were reminded of them to the point that it became a part of their lives. That gift is now ours to cherish and pass on in our Freemason Lodges and in our communities.
