To preserve the purity of our Lodge and to maintain unimpaired out ancient rites and ceremonies instruction is necessary. The mysteries of Freemasonry are to be unfolded and its moral duties impressed. The minds of our brethren are to be enlarged and informed.

But Masonic principles cannot be the exclusive property of Freemasons. They are universal. They must be shared. The ethics and tenants of Freemasonry should be the common possession of all right thinking men and women. They will be if we as dedicated Master Mason will share them.

There can be no dedication without education in making a difference and should be constantly borne in mind in our daily duties, responsibilities and teaching.

Throughout the centuries we have left Masonic Education out of our lodges. We have placed our full concentration on the ritual of the Craft. We have neglected to teach the meaning behind the ritual.

We need to learn the A B C's of Freemasonry. We must start with the interesting, the simple, the obvious and what is well known. Then we must graduate to the spiritual values found in the Craft. We must go about learning and teaching the history, tradition, symbolism, philosophy, benevolence and meaning of Masonic principles as we did the ritual a piece at a time.

The ritual is the thread that unites us into one sacred band of friends and brothers. Symbolism is the soul of the Fraternity. Masonic history is the wisdom through which we witness human struggle and achievement and see Masonic principles at work. Courage, strength, and confidence in the teachings and philosophy of the Craft are built from seeing the evidence of what other Freemasons have done.

We can start this campaign to turn members into Freemasons by reading good Masonic books. Through books we can learn; without them we can acquire but little knowledge.

As we learn about Freemasonry we learn more about human beings; we discover what we came here to do. We find that all religious men, regardless of their sectarian persuasion, have faith in the Great Architect of the Universe. They may call him Jehovah, Allah, or by one of the multitude of names, but He is still God.

Through studies that have been made by industry during the past half century we have learned many things about human nature. What these studies reveal are important to Freemasonry. One important discovery pointed out that man's creativity is being wasted. Less than twenty per cent of the creative ability of man is being used. This leaves over eighty per cent going to waste. What a golden opportunity this is for Freemasonry! What an opportunity this is for each of us to accomplish what we came here to do!

Freemasonry, that advocated an eight hour day when a sixteen hour day was the rule, should take the lead in fulfilling man's needs. Freemasonry should create an atmosphere wherein men will be anxious to achieve the goals of our lodge.

Why? Why should we turn over creativity loose within the framework of

Freemasonry? Because there is no other organization that can do so much for the world. Freemasonry incorporates only that which is good. It has no dogmas, no theology, and no political motives that divide. It has only the good that unites.

An organization that teaches the Brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God cannot be wrong. It is only those who haven't learned what they came here to do who can harm the Fraternity. (End)

# Let us start by first understanding the position of the Master (the symbol Square, teaches morality and virtue) and why.

The master of a Masonic lodge is a unique leader. Once elected he inherits significant powers to rule and govern the members of the lodge. He is invested with time honored responsibilities that are unlike those of the president of any other society, and he is given unusual authority in the discharge of his duties. Once installed, he cannot be removed by vote of his brethren who elected him. Only a Masonic trail for malfeasance in office, or action by the grand master can take him out of office.

Many organizations have the office of past president, but only serving as the master of a masonic lodge confers unique status of a past master, and then only after having fully discharged the duties laid upon him at this installation. The master of a lodge who resigns, or does not complete his term as master (unless he dies in office) does not become a past master. How did all this come about?

The origin of the office of master of a Masonic lodge is lost in the mists of history, along with the origin of Freemasonry itself. But as far back as we have any record, the office of master existed. In 1717, when the first grand lodge was formed in London, England, the four lodges that formed it placed the oldest Master Mason then present who was also the master of one of the lodges in the chair as grand master pro tem, and then proceeded to elect a grand master.

The Ancients a rival grand lodge of the original grand lodge of 1717 claimed to preserve the oldest traditions of Freemasonry. With the Ancients, the office of past master

was specially esteemed. Among both the Moderns (as the premier grand lodge was called) and the Ancients, the Master Mason degree was originally a qualifying degree for those who wished to become a master of the lodge. In fact, the third degree was originally called the master's part because it was designed to instruct the future master in the significant duties of his office. ACGL as an example follows the tradition of Moderns by allowing a warden to preside over the lodge if the master is not present. However, a warden does not exercise all the rights and powers of the installed master, even in this jurisdiction. Some prerogatives are reserved only to the man who has been elected and installed as master.

What does this say about the master as the leader of the lodge? He is the leader because he was elected and installed as such by his brethren. Once elected and installed, he becomes the master teacher as well as the head of the lodge. He becomes the master workman, the master designer, who sets the lodge at work, and gives them the necessary instructions to do what they are supposed to do as Masons. He has been especially set apart for this work, and having been set apart, he cannot every truly return to the body as the workmen in the same status as before his election and installation as master.

That is why the rank of past master is considered to be the highest rank within the power of the lodge to grant to one of its members.

Leadership in Freemasonry is thus much more than simply being elected as the presiding officer of a lodge; it is the conferring of a dignity which the order that is unrivaled by any other, except for that of grand master. Indeed, when he becomes master of his lodge he occupies "the dignified and honorable position to which the suffrage" or his brethren has called him. (End)


Lane will also be buried at the Dallas Fort Worth National Cemetery.

# **Masonic Education**

# **BROTHERLY LOVE, RELIEF and TRUTH.**

Brotherly Love means the development of that confidence whereby we may regard a fellow-man in the highest valuation as a companion and friend -- not from any materialistic viewpoint, but because of the virtuous character he is found to possess and of the sincere friendship he is observed to practice.

Masonic Relief does not mean, primarily, monetary relief; and, notwithstanding that large sums of money are disbursed annually in that respect, a member has no claim on Masonry for financial relief. Its meaning is found in the broader interpretation: that of advice, encouragement and moral assistance. At the same time, charity is not relegated to a subsidiary place; for, charity is the great distinctive feature of the Masonic heart and is bounded only be due discretion respecting one's family.

Truth needs no elaboration. Its meaning is obvious; for Truth is the supreme virtue without which nothing can be certain or secure, and all else must inevitably crumble in helpless ruin and decay. "The eternal years of God are hers".

The principles of Masonry are clear and distinct. While they do involve social and moral obligations, our organization is not a religious fraternity within the restricted interpretation that would mean it to be exclusively identified with any one particular creed or sect or denomination. Masonry admonishes its members steadfastly to practice the Golden Rule; and it teaches and maintains a high sense of respect for and toleration towards all religions. To all Masons it recommends serious study and consideration of the scriptures as contained in the Volume of the Sacred Law that lies upon the altars of its lodges. It believes that therein is provided safe and sane guidance concerning man's duty to God, to his neighbor, to his family and to himself. Indeed, our symbolism places God as the center of all things. Masonry ever strives to bring its members into closer harmony with the Divine Being and counsels them to observe reverence and humility which ought always to exist between the creature and his Creator.

Neither is Masonry a political party nor an ally of any political party. It leaves its members free to form for themselves their individual political affiliations. Yet Masonry does inculcate a commonsense conception of good citizenship. Moral obligations bind its members to respect and uphold, not to subvert, established authority and order; and, while remembering with filial affection the land of birth, to remain loyal to the law of the land, which, at least for the time being, extends the courtesy and the privileges of residence and citizenship.

Concerning the duties of a Mason: of first importance are the exercise of strictest caution in guarding the mysteries and secrets of the Craft; fidelity to its principles; loyalty to the officers of his lodge; and unqualified obedience to its laws and regulations. Regular attendance at meetings is, of course, an implied duty, for there the member takes his proper place in the consideration and direction of the affairs of his lodge and of

Masonry generally. So, also, regular payment of dues is essential; for only thereby is a lodge enabled to discharge its obligations and to function to the fullest extent in all branches of the work.

There are many other matters, all of them interesting, that might be mentioned -- for instance, the organization and conduct of a lodge. But there is not occasion here to enter into details of these unless desired. If there be any questions, we shall be pleased to give what information we may and can impart.

### The Third Degree

No, not like in an old Bogart picture where some sniveling squealer gets worked over with a 200-watt light bulb in his eyes and a rubber hose. The *third degree* is the highest degree or level of ceremony conferred in a Masonic lodge. It's known as the Master Mason degree; the two that come before it are the Entered Apprentice and the Fellow Craft degrees. You may encounter other Masonic degrees that have higher numbers, bestowed by some other branches within Freemasonry, but they are not more important or of any higher rank than the Master Mason.

# On the Level

To a Freemason, on the level means just that — all Freemasons are Brothers who meet on the same level, regardless of their social or economic status outside the lodge. Princes, presidents, and captains of business are no better or more important than bus drivers, plumbers, and paper boys when they sit in the lodge together. Masonry does not detract from a man's accomplishments, nor does it exalt him above his Brothers because of his position outside the lodge.

# On the Square

When a stonemason cuts a block to use in the construction of a building, it must be perfectly shaped so that it will support the other blocks that surround it. The block's sides must all be perfectly straight with no faults, so that it will do its part as just one small piece of a much larger building. To check the reliability of his workmanship, the stonemason uses a tool called a *square*, shaped like a right angle, to determine whether the sides and angles of the stone are perfect. Freemasons use the

term on the square to describe their trust in each other. A man who is on the square is honest and reliable, and is a strong part of the whole community around him. The term on the square is also used to mean "just between you and me." When one Mason tells another Mason something he'd like to be kept private, he'll often say "This is on the square."

# Worshipful Master

The primary officer of the local Masonic lodge is called the *Worshipful Master*. This does not mean that Freemasons "worship" him. The position is like that of a president in other organizations. The term comes from Old English and is used to mean "greatly honored." Mayors of English and Canadian cities are still referred to as "Your Worship." Because Masonry has its origins in England during the Middle Ages, the term has been passed down through the centuries and has been retained. I'd like to go on record as saying that if it *does* mean "worship," my lodges didn't do nearly enough of it when I held the position.

# Cowan

The Tyler's job is to keep off all "cowans and eavesdroppers". The term *cowan* is unusual and its origin is probably from a very old Anglo-Saxon word meaning "dog." *Cowan* came to be a Scottish word used as a putdown to describe stonemasons who did not join the Freemasons guild, while the English used it to describe Masons who built rough stone walls without mortar and did not know the true secrets of Freemasonry.

# Hoodwink

Today, the term *hoodwink* has come to mean "to trick" or "to deceive." But in a Masonic lodge, it's a very old term used to describe a blindfold. *Hood* means "cover," and *wink* means "closed eye." While being led through portions of the three degrees of the Masonic lodge, the candidate is *hoodwinked*, to prevent him from seeing certain features of the room until the proper time in the ceremony, to focus his attention on the words he is hearing,

and to symbolize the search for *light*, or knowledge. It does *not* mean he is being tricked or lied to.

#### Token

A *token* is a grip or handshake that is used by Freemasons to identify each other. Each of the degrees of Masonry has its own handshake that identifies the level of proficiency attained by a member. It enables one Mason to silently know another one without either calling attention to himself.

# **Blackballed**

When Masons vote on a new member, they use a ballot box that contains white balls (for "yes") and black balls (for "no"). The opening of the box is hidden from the view of the other members, and each Mason votes in secret. Voting against the election of a new member in a Masonic election has come to be called *blackballing*, and its use has spread to the outside world as well. These days, to prevent confusion while groping around in a little wooden box, the black pieces are now often cube-shaped, to avoid voting incorrectly by mistake. *Blackcubing* just doesn't sound right, so the term *blackballing* remains.

# So Mote It Be

The phrase "So mote it be" is used by Masons as a response at the end of a prayer. It comes from an Old English phrase that simply means "so may it be," and has been used in Masonic documents since its earliest beginnings. Masons use it as an affirmation of a prayer as a response to amen, a word of similar meaning.

# Are You a Traveling Man?

One of the many phrases used when two Masons meet and are unsure of each other's membership status, this question refers to a line in the Master Mason degree, "Whence come you and whither are you traveling?" Other greetings can be, "I see you've traveled some," "Hello, Hiram," or "Are you a Widow's Son?" More obscure is "How old is your Mother?" a question that refers to the number of your home lodge. These exchanges between strangers on a sidewalk often result in baffled looks from your spouse or non-Masonic friends.



As we prepare to celebrate Thanksgiving 2017 we have so much for which to be grateful. Now, as the holiday season is upon us and we look forward to enjoying another great family occasion, I want to extend our warmest personal greeting to each of you and those you love.
